## FROM YOUR **PASTOR**

And now we welcome the new year, full of things that have never been.

According to a Google search on "best new year's quotes," this observation by Rainier Maria Rilke is the favorite. There is something about a new year that kindles hope. We have faith that the "things that have never been" are going to be



good---or at least better than last year. We count down the seconds, pop the champagne cork, and celebrate . . . . possibility, anticipation, renewal. We make resolutions to reinforce our intentions to make it a better, healthier, more peaceful year.

# THE COLORADO TRUST, A HEALTH EQUITY FOUNDATION

Pastor Louise has been selected as one of nine trustees of the Colorado Trust. Established by the sale of Presbyterian/St. Luke's Hospital to Health One, the Trust manages funds in excess of \$460 million dollars, and builds partnerships with communities throughout Colorado to address health access and equity. The Presbytery of Denver receives an annual grant for its operations. Last year over thirty-seven million dollars was distributed in five health equity areas: Health and Well Being, Health Data, Community Partnerships, and Health Equity Investments. Pastor Louise is looking forward to this service, so resonant with Central's historic commitment to health care access and community service.


One Book for One Church

One was for the church to engage in conversations about race. As part of this work, our Co-Moderators ask the church to be part of "One Book for One Church" program by reading and exploring Debbie Irving's book Waking Up White. While Rev. Edmiston agrees that our "book" is the Bible, she invites us to think of Irving's work as a "bonus book to read alongside the Bible."
