Food for the Body and Food for the Soul

245 Central members and friends volunteered over 4400 hours this summer! As we put our faith into action during the Summer of Service, we proved that service is, in fact, central here. ROAD MAP TO A CAPITAL CAMPAIGN

The Session recently approved a plan of action to lay the foundation for a capital campaign in support of Central's growing mission and our magnificent, historic building that is such a key part of its accomplishment. A Guidance Team was elected to lead the first preparatory steps: Andy Kenney, Derek Jones, David Daniel, Lynne Brown, Chris Wineman, and staff members Joe Martell, Wil Smith, and Pastor Louise Westfall. Session authorized the Guidance Team to select a campaign consultant, develop the final choice of projects, and engage a Design Team to determine cost projections. The group will draw upon the thorough building analysis completed by the Building and Property Committee, the 10-year financial outlook developed by Budget and Finance Committee, Central's Strategic Plan, and the Recommendations of the Task Force for Central's Thriving Future. Members of the Guidance Team were commissioned in worship September 11, and ask the congregation to keep this enterprise in thought and prayer. Please don't hesitate to ask questions or raise concerns with any member of the Guidance Team.

FROM YOUR **PASTOR**

New members often ask me some version of the following questions: How much money should I pledge to the church? What do most people pledge? How much is the annual budget? How much is supported by member gifts and how much through Central's endowment?

Good questions, and ones that reflect the changing landscape of church life in America. Unlike some religious traditions that require

an annual membership fee, giving at Central is entirely voluntary. We will extend the same welcome, care, and service whether or not you give, and no matter the amount of your gifts. Yet annually we invite you to consider your financial commitment to the church's mission as an active intention toward your own spiritual growth, and the growth of Central's mission and ministries.

There are a number of yardsticks we might use as we consider our personal commitment. The Bible speaks of giving "first fruits" to God-right off the top---at a tithe of 10%. In recognition that many divide their charitable giving among several causes, an elder in a previous church suggested a "Presbyterian tithe" of 5%. Another way to think about it is to consider the role Central has in your life and the life of downtown Denver. Where do you see the hand of God at work here? What of our missions and ministries prompts your participation and gratitude? Remember too that one of our high priority goals is to reduce draws upon the unrestricted portion of our endowment to preserve them for capital expenditures and expanding mission. We want to close the gap between expenses and revenue raised by member and non-member and new member giving. Personal reflection on these matters can be a kind of spiritual discernment exercise, both to help us perceive God more clearly in daily life, and to encourage generosity and trust. Sermons and witnesses each Sunday will engage us with personal testimony about the difference Central makes to them.

I hope you'll sign up for one of ten gatherings offered in members' homes during October and early November (dates and locations in the narthex). In each we'll enjoy food and fellowship together, and hear a brief presentation about Central's mission and how it is funded. We'll also hold two sessions following worship on November 6 and 13 to present this information and respond to questions. The Generosity Team led by David Daniel has challenged the congregation to raise the overall amount of pledged income by 5%. We know that everyone's financial situation and responsibilities are different, and each of us will determine our annual giving accordingly.

Later this month you'll receive a letter and pledge card. Please fill it out and return to the church by November 15. You can also pledge online at our website centraldenver.com. We will announce the total and dedicate our financial commitments on Thanksgiving Sunday, November 20. We're setting the table for the nourishing mission and vital ministries which God is preparing and to which God is calling us. Please join us!

MISSION CENTER UPDATE

Last month, we shared that the Property Committee had contracted with a code consultant who would investigate, among other questions, what would need to be done to be in compliance if we were hosting visiting mission groups overnight. The consultant reported back that since the groups would be making donations to Central to help cover the building and staffing expenses of their visit, we would need to be rezoned to a residential facility. Among other requirements, residential facilities must have sprinklers in every room which Central does not currently have. It is truly cost prohibitive for Central add these sprinklers. There is a small chance that we could be granted an exemption by the city. While we are pursuing that option, we are also aware that these code requirements may impede implementing a mission center in Cleland Hall.

September Session Highlights

At its stated meeting on September 20, the Session took the following actions:

*approved a team of elders to examine Stephanie Fritz and Nick Vanderpol for ordination on October 16;

*approved up to \$7500 from the Cockrill Distinguished Visitor Fund of the endowment to support the expenses and honorarium for John Bell, Celtic theologian and musician as Visiting Theologian in February 2017;

*approved \$3352 from the unrestricted endowment to cover the cost of repairing a leaking steam valve in the Heritage Center; the full list of unrestricted endowment draws in 2015-16 is available from clerk Nileen Hart.

*approved the request of the Music and Arts Committee to serve wine at five Sturgeon Room/Gallery art exhibit openings in 2016-17, fully compliant with the Alcohol Use Policy.

*reviewed plans for the 2017 annual stewardship campaign, and heard a preliminary report on 2017 budget development.


